





Factors affecting Substance Abuse

Genetic Factors



Members of the same household more likely to suffer from addiction.



Genetic factors

Can be responsible for up to 50% of risk factors



Studied were done on adopted siblings and twins.

Genetics of addictive traits

Why do some people have a higher Chance of becoming drug addicts?

"The genetic variations that predispose a person to being an addict seem to be mutations that *dampen* the dopamine system."

David Linden, PhD, a neuroscience professor at Johns Hopkins' School of Medicine.



Addictive Personality

Definition:

Addictive personality is a term used to describe personality traits that can be recognized in people who have a higher risk of becoming addicted to psychoactive substances. People with this higher addiction risk include those who are:

- Adventurous and risk-taking
- Disconnected and cautious
- Obsessive and compulsive
- Apathetic
- Sensation Seeking



Signs of Addictive personality in children

Risk-takers

Children who are daredevils that enjoy racing faster than others on bikes or skateboards, or climbing trees higher.

Experimenters

Young children (between ages 9 and 12) experimenting with drugs or alcohol, have a much greater risk of later becoming addicted.

Impulsiveness

Not learning how to control their impulses children want instant gratification. They are impatient and intolerant to frustration.
